

REGULAR “HYBRID/ZOOM” MEETING

July 5, 2022

The Common Council of the City of Michigan City, Indiana, met in Regular session on Tuesday evening, July 5, 2022, at the hour of 6:30 p.m., Hosted by “Hybrid/Zoom” and streamed live on “My Michigan City” Facebook Page.

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by President Deutch.

President Deutch stated that we lost a public figure what was a mainstay here in Michigan City; Thomas Fedder who was our City Clerk for Thirty-two (32) years asking that we keep his extended family in our prayers for all his friends and family that he played a significant role in our community.

President Deutch advised that she received telephone calls from Council members, Mack, P. Przybylinski, and Simmons and that they will not be attending this evening’s meeting and that they are excused and that Councilman Fitzpatrick will be a few minutes late.

Roll call was authorized, and the following were noted present and/or absent.

ABSENT: COUNCIL MEMBERS Michael Mack, Gene Simmons, and Paul Przybylinski (3).

A QUORUM WAS NOTED PRESENT

ALSO, PRESENT: Council Attorney Snow, Gale Neulieb City Clerk and Stacy Dudley Asst. Deputy Clerk.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

President Deutch inquired whether there were any deletions, additions, or corrections to the “Hybrid Zoom” Regular meeting held on June 21, 2022, there was no response.

Councilman D. Przybylinski made a motion to approve the minutes of the “Hybrid/Zoom”, Regular meeting held on June 21, 2022, a motion to second was made by Councilman Dabney.

President Deutch asked if there were any comments, there was no response

The Regular Hybrid/Zoom Council meeting held on June 21, 2022 minutes were approved by the following vote: **AYES:** Council members Deutch, D. Przybylinski, Zygus, Tillman, Dabney, and Fitzpatrick (6) **NAYS:** Council member None (0).

REPORTS of STANDING COMMITTEES

President Deutch asked if there were any reports of standing committees.

Councilwoman Tillman updated the Council regarding the Commission of the Social Status of African American Males and the help of Attorney Harris Law Firm we amended the by-laws, and they are established with the Commission approving the new bylaw and are now known as the “Michigan City Commission on the Social Status of African American Males” with one issue remaining with the Minority Health Partners removing

themselves as a partnership with this commission and will amend the ordinance to remove and possibly replace this entity.

President Deutch asked if there were any other reports of Standing Committees, there was no response.

FINANCE REPORT

Councilwoman Tillman advised the Riverboat and Boyd Claims Docket for July 5, 2022 Riverboat \$15,276.00, no claims for Boyd Development with the total claims of \$15,276.00 which was to Clark, Quinn, Moses, Scott & Grahn, LLP for professional/legal services.

President Deutch asked if there were any comments or questions from the Council, there was no response.

REPORTS OF SPECIAL or SELECT COMMITTEES

President Deutch asked if there were any reports of Special or Select Committees there was no response.

REPORTS FROM THE MAYOR OR OTHER CITY OFFICERS AND DEPARTMENTS

President Deutch advised that MCPD Chief Dion Campbell and Assistant Chiefs Marty Corley and Jillian Ashley are present this evening to explain public safety features for Michigan City; introducing representatives from “Flock Safety” Atlanta, Georgia that did a presentation about automatic license plate readers (ALPR) and what it can do to bring crime statistics down in our community.

Discussion ensued between the "Flock Safety" team Chief Campbell, President Deutch and Council members D. Przybylinski, Zygas, Tillman, Fitzpatrick, and Dabney regarding the automatic license plate readers being proposed to our city.

President Deutch asked if there were any comments from the public.

Tommy Kulavik, 1316 Ohio Street stated that there should be Flock camera on every corner; commenting on reasons why he feels that these cameras are needed and asked how soon this company can deliver and get this project moving forward.

Rodney McCormick, 617 Union Street stated that technology is not the problem, technology won't corrupt but individuals that run the technology can; advising that he is in favor of this project but we want something in return; commenting on body cam footage that if a citizen request to see it they shouldn't have to beg for it; we keep giving to the police but again we don't get anything in return.

Mr. McCormick stated several issues he received from many neighbors in our community with problems they have had with our police department asking this council to pay attention to all aspects about what is being proposed as you move forward.

Bruce Metic, 619 Hobart Street asked if we move forward with the cameras; will the City own the cameras and Folk be responsible to destroy the data every thirty (30) days.

Folk representative advised that you could do an amazon service/government cloud; stating the government cloud is the most secure cloud server that is available and that Folk is only the stewards; Michigan City owns the data and is the setting that we have set up to automatically deletes data every 30 days on a one basis for this break.

Mr. Metic asked if Folk has a good record in terms of defense council attacking your system in defense of cases; with Folk representatives advising that they have a team of ten (10) security engineers full time on our staff that are actively looking for bugs, and they have bounty programs out that they're asking people to hack our system and they haven't been able to; also advising that we all have to do training every single week, as users, because that's usually your most vulnerable place to hack is users, fishing scams and that sort of things.

Ken Fly, 211 Fulton Street stated that this was a good presentation from Folk advising this Council has heard all the "pro's" regarding these automatic license plate readers; asking what are some of "con's" some issues/things that were wrong and didn't work that you have come across, getting where you are today; questioning if this is another form of being able to racial profile our community; especially where these cameras are going to be located.

Chief Campbell addressed Mr. Fly's comments advising that we're profiling crime when looking at statistics and that these cameras belong in our high crime areas; if that just so happens to be in the black community; are we saying that just because it's the black community, we're going to allow crime to happen there; "I think not" and that what we are doing is looking at our entire community and neighborhoods in Michigan City and where the crime is located with it only making sense to put this technology where you have your high crime areas; with this technology being in indiscriminate and no facial recognition.

Councilman Fitzpatrick stated from his professional perspective as a death investigator; questioning the thirty (30) day retention it being deleted, is it being deleted from your database or from data base that the city has access to if it's deleted from the cloud; asking if after thirty (30) days does it go to the Flock's data base or the City's data base.

Flock's representative advised with the thirty (30) day retention; it is deleted from the data base, advising that the City has access to its deleted data from the cloud after the thirty (30) days; stating that if it is needed for a piece of evidence police can download it and save it in their normal evidence management system.

Discussion ensued between President Deutch, Councilman Fitzpatrick, Councilwoman Zygas and Flock's representatives regarding the thirty (30) day timeframe of deleting data that will be saved in our data base and what is saved in the cloud, and that the timeframe of thirty (30) days could be changed, but it would have to be done through an ordinance being adopted.

Councilman Dabney wanted to address Mr. Fly's comments before he left, stating that if everyone will recall the last council went through this license plate reader with that system would have been attached to the front of each police vehicle which when riding around certain neighborhoods would have targeted certain neighborhoods with the last council unanimously voting this system down because of that concern; believing that this is going to be a good system to help get our crime statistics down.

Councilwoman Tillman asked about the trial period, that we will have an opportunity to do a sixty (60) trial and that this something she hopes the police department will be able to implement in and review/process showing the pros and cons along with giving this council some data to come back and look at.

President Deutch asked how the weather affects or impact the system; advising the equipment is solar powered, and we do what is called winterization each year, that they make enough solar battery packs that last throughout winter months

President Deutch asked if there were any other reports from the mayor or other city officers or departments.

Chief Doug Legault commented giving a big thank you and stating how proud he is of his firefighters and lifeguards for the great job they are doing, as all of you probably know there were nine (9) people saved over this last 4th of July weekend; seven of them were pulled out by our lifeguards, one incident was saved by a citizen and the ninth Firefighter Kyle Kish from our dive team saved this person; and because of these nine (9) people being saved their families are now enjoying their family members instead of basically scheduling a funeral; and that there has been thirteen (13) structure fires during the month of May and June.

Chief Lagault stated that Councilman D. Przybylinski also asked to get him the information on overdoses within our community; advising the information isn't pin point but there has been one-hundred and forty seven (147) overdoses from January 1st to date in Laporte County with seventy-six (76) of them from the Michigan City area.

Councilman D. Przybylinski thanked Chief Lagault for attending our meeting this evening and giving us this information; requesting if the council could get a monthly report regarding "overdoses" would be greatly appreciated, that this amount of people overdosing let us know we definitely have a problem.

Councilman D. Przybylinski thanked the fire department and the lifeguards for all they do in our community.

Councilman Fitzpatrick asked if the amount of overdoses in our city could be tracked by looking at the addresses to get the actual amount of people.

Chief Lagault advised there are thousands of medicals calls to go through; advising that he is working on the totals.

President Deutch asked if there were any other comments or reports, there was no response.

President Deutch asked Clerk Neulieb if there were any petitions this evening.

WHEREAS, rather than purchase the street sweeper and leaf vacuum, at this time, the Street Department Director requests that said appropriated funds now be spent on the following equipment as set forth on **Exhibit A**, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and the Common Council now desire to implement the recommendations of the Street Department Director and allow funds appropriated in the 2022 budget in the Riverboat Fund to now be utilized to purchase the equipment set forth on **Exhibit A**.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MICHIGAN CITY, INDIANA COMMON COUNCIL AS FOLLOWS:

1. The aforementioned "Whereas" sections are incorporated herein as if fully set forth herein.

2. The funds in both Account #2042 116.445.020 (\$280,000.00) and Account #2042 116.445.050 (\$20,000.00) shall now be utilized to purchase equipment outlined in **Exhibit A**.

EXHIBIT "A"

Funding was approved in 2022 in the 2023 Central Services Capital Budget for the Street Department for the purchase of one street sweeper for the year 2023 upon further review, I have determined that the need is greater for vehicles and equipment, therefore, I am requesting to acquire the following equipment instead:

1. One Asphalt Patch Recycler – approx. \$55,000.00
2. Six (6) solar power radar speed limit signs to be installed at three (3) City parks – approx...\$48,000.00; and
3. Five-year lease to purchase of a Backhoe Loader with attachments. Two hundred and fifty work hours per year for five years – approximately\$180,000.00

Once this request is approved, I will then commence the competitive procurement process per the Board of Works Purchasing Policy to acquire these items.

President Deutch asked if any of the sponsors had anything to add.

Councilman D. Przybylinski stated that there is already money in the budget and is just being transferred within the department that we are getting a street sweeper and leaf back instead of getting one asphalt patch recycler and six (6) solar power radar speed limit signs installed at three (3) city parks for \$48,000 and a five year lease to purchase a back hole loader with attachments which is with 250 work hours per year, with a contract for approximately \$180,000.00.

President Deutch and Councilwoman Tillman asked to be added as co-sponsors.

Councilwoman Tillman advised that she had the chance to talk to Councilman P. Przybylinski asking her to elaborate on the street sweeper that Councilman P. Przybylinski had the opportunity to speak with the Sanitary District advising that the Sanitary District is going to possibly assist with the funding.

President Deutch asked if there were any comments from the public.

Shong Smith, Street Department Superintendent explained the reasons why these three (3) parks were chosen to have the radar signs placed at them; advising these signs are

located at several parks in Laporte where he went and watched the traffic flow at a few of them and that when traffic approached these signs they break and slowed down which is what they want see happen.

Mr. Smith advised Councilman Fitzpatrick that these signs are used mostly at parks, churches and school zones.

Mr. Smith advised Councilman Dabney that the cost of one of these radar signs are \$14,000, there is six (6) being purchased with a total of \$48,000

President Deutch asked if there were any additional comments from the Council.

Councilwoman Zygus made a motion to approve the proposed resolution, second by Councilman D. Przybylinski.

President Deutch asked if the public had any comments at this time.

Ernie Hullahan 302 Gladys Street questioned why the South Shore Trains blow their horn going past Gladys Street where he lives at 3:30 a.m. every morning.

President Deutch advised Mr. Hullahan that she would send written complaint into them as well.

Tommy Kulavik, 1316 Ohio Street stated that he believes these quiet zones are going to increase car versus train accidents in Michigan City due to not sounding the horns at intersections.

Rodney McCormick, 617 Union Street, asked if this quiet zone has anything to do with the closure of Holiday Street and placing guardrails at Holiday Street.

Councilwoman Tillman stated that she attended a few of the workshops where the engineer and our City Planner presented the maps of Holiday Street, Carroll Avenue, and School Street and that they are not going to be closed; advising there is a section of Holiday Street that will be closed off and become a green space and will be implementing a six (6) inch medium median and new guard rails; with the one-way streets having a double guard rail for safety and preventative measures.

Mr. McCormick asked the Council if they ever take the time and listen to what the citizens want since each of them are public servants; that he spoke to several neighbors in this area and none of them want what is being proposed, that nine (9) out of ten (10) of the residents don't want Holiday Street closed.

Councilman Dabney advised that this is not closing Holiday Street advising that he took a picture when we were at our meeting to talk about the different crossings were School Street, Grace Street, Woodland, Pleasant Avenue and Carroll Avenue; stating what is happening is the crossings they're going to be made safe so that they can be a quiet zone.

President Deutch asked if there were any additional comments from the public, there was no response.

President Deutch stated that before we go to Council comments that this proposed ordinance was advertised in the Herald Dispatch and that there was a formal public hearing held on June 21, 2022.

President Deutch asked if there were any comments from the Council at this time.

Councilman D. Przybylinski thanked all the department heads and their staff for their hard work over the fourth of July weekend, that he participated in the parade and had a great time.

Councilman D. Przybylinski asked Mayor Parry to attend the last two meetings to address the council regarding the hiring of a City Engineer or what the status is on the agreements we have with local engineers and report on what streets and sidewalks are in the budget for repair and replacement for the rest of 2022; to date have not received

any response and we need to get these projects together and get going before it turns cold and we can't do anything for another year.

President Deutch reiterated what Tommy Kulavik stated about that these mass shooting are happening more and more often and we're almost becoming immune to some of it commenting on some of the issues we are facing within our country.
