

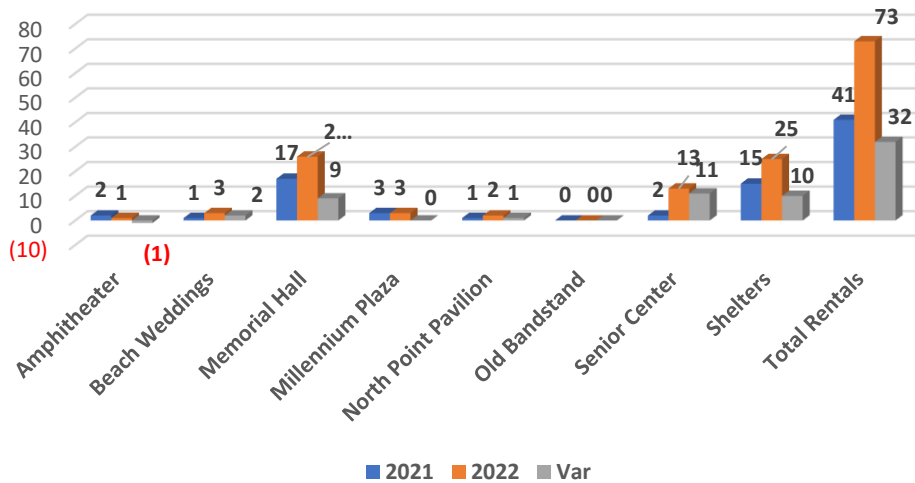

## Attendance

We did not track attendance in 2021 as it was previously hand counted. Our new system began tracking in January 2022. Third quarter attendance for 2022 was 4,565.

## Events

- Jul-22 The South Shore Seniors Investment Club continued with their monthly meetings
- Jul-22 Aperion Care sponsored a "Beat the Heat" event. This was the 2<sup>nd</sup> part of a 3-part series. This time they served free popsicles to our members.
- Jul-22 Introduction to Essential Oils Part II was presented by Karen Rader on the health benefits of using natural products to help make your home smell nice, refreshing your laundry, using as perfume, and using as holistic remedies for many common ailments. This session focused on cleaning products.
- Jul-22 Popcorn and a Movie was held to a full house of about 30 members as they viewed "American Underdog" and enjoyed free popcorn
- Jul-22 Coffee with the Mayor was held to a crowd of about 15 members
- Jul-22 The Red Hat Society held their annual anniversary party. About 70 members were in attendance.
- Jul-22 Card Making with Jeanene. Approximately 10 members attend this monthly craft session where they make specialty greeting cards.
- Jul-22 What's That Bird? A presentation by a local birding expert, and member, to about 30 members. This session focused on birds of the Indiana Dunes. This free event will have a Part II that will focus on winter birds of Northern Indiana.

**Weather**

After the hot, humid summer, the cooler autumn temperatures are a welcome change. Hopefully with the recent rainfall we can decrease utilizing our irrigation systems, letting mother nature take over.

We have currently pumped 13,461,000 gallons from our south course pond compared to 15,398,000 last year, and 4,649,000 from the north course pond compared to 5,749,000 gallons last year. We have not had to use our recharge well this year.

**Course Maintenance**

Although the grass growth has slowed down, we continued to mow greens 3 to 4 times a week, fairways and tees twice a week, and all rough twice a week. This is still necessary to maintain

proper playing conditions. After significant storms, we cleaned up 6 fallen trees, two of which fell on putting greens. With autumn upon us, leaf removal will be a high priority.

**Equipment**

Down time due to equipment breakdowns has become more and more frequent with our aging equipment. These issues are only going to increase until we can upgrade several key pieces of our mowing equipment. Delivery time on new equipment is now out one year or more if we were to place an order today.

## Capital Improvements and General Updates

### July

- Holladay Construction Company's safety fence went up and the work began on the major habitat improvements for the African Lion and Bengal Tiger habitats
- The education van and the dump truck had routine oil changes and tire check services donated by long-time zoo supporter DeVries Tire Company
- The zoo had our surprise annual USDA inspection which we passed with no non-compliance issues
- The zoo assisted the LaPorte County Animal Control with a few exotic and farm animal calls including the direct transport of a monkey to a local primate sanctuary, the temporary housing of four goats, a gecko, two rabbits, and a tortoise until a permanent home could be found for them. We are always happy to continue our partnership with local animal rescue and wildlife groups for the betterment of the animals and to assist the community.

### August

- We repainted the Upper Aviary interior building, the Red Barn fence, the Coop concession exterior, and other areas of the zoo
- Patchwork concrete repairs were done on the aging River Otter pool
- A tree limb fell onto the Discovery Building's restroom hallway and created some major leaking issues when it rains, so we are working with a few local roofing companies to get quotes for the repairs. The hole has been securely covered until that time.
- We had a professional general assessment done on the other building roofs and trees on the grounds to hopefully get an action plan to prevent future issues
- The Peacock Café had a pop-up inspection by the LaPorte County Health Department and passed with no non-compliant issues found
- We dedicated a bench plaque to Great Lakes Grand Prix WHM team owner and driver Billy Mauff for all of his support for the zoo
- The zoo became a facility member of the American Association of Zoo Keepers (AAZK)

- The new pickup truck purchased with 2022 capital funds was delivered and had the zoo’s logo installed on the side doors and tailgate panel
- The LaPorte County Convention & Visitors Bureau conducted visitor surveys during one day of the National Boat Race event

**September**

- We applied for two “Power for Good” grants from the Unity Foundation of LaPorte County to replace the fence in front of the Fallow Deer exhibit and for needed repairs to the River Otter concrete pool
- We completed the 2022 grant report and submitted three requests for 2023 projects to the Otto and Margaret Zack Charitable Trust for projects listed in our Master Plan
- Started planning and decorating for “Boo at the Zoo” which included some necessary changes to keep everyone safe due to redirected pathways for the construction of the Big Cat Habitat
- The club cart needs a front end replacement and a work order has been prepared for off-season repairs
- We welcomed volunteers from GAF to help with grounds and painting projects
- The zoo was closed to guests from September 19th through September 22<sup>nd</sup> for maintenance to the Jungle Building that required us to move the animals into the off-view holding areas. All projects were completed, including deep cleaning, concrete work, painting, and pest control applications.
- The staff participated in an online San Diego Academy course for disaster preparedness safety training
- We are currently reviewing the training, management, and operation protocol for the guest services areas of the zoo to ensure that we continue to use the most efficient and current mandated standards
